



## Statistics relating to detective designations of Australian Federal Police (AFP) members

This document has been created pursuant to s17 of the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (Cth).

## 1. The current number of members with a detective designation

As at the date of data extraction, there were 920 detectives across the AFP.

## 2. The current number of members with a detective designation for each relevant command

See the following table which shows a breakdown of detectives by command, as at the date of data extraction.






Southern Command

Note that a number of 'specialist' commands have detectives that are physically deployed within the RegionalCommands with dotted lines<sup>2</sup> back to their respective specialist command. Therefore, the above is not necessarily an accurate reflection of the number of detectives attached to specific commands as this is subject to deployment based on operational priorities.

For example: Counter Terrorism and Special Investigations Command have detectives across the country. However, because the detectives are physically located in Regional Command, those detectives are counted under Eastern Command.

## 3. The current number of active but undetermined applications for a detective designation
